He did a ring divination trick where he guessed which hand his ring was in. He also did a book test. He did a number prediction using a magic square in which the numbers added up to 41. He did some Rubik's cube magic and another book test using a telephone book and a cell phone camera. It was a very interesting and fast-paced show. After his performance, **Jay** received a standing ovation. Everyone enjoyed his show.

To end the event for the evening, there was a 50/50 draw. Chelsea Kita drew the ticket. Photography was done by Simon Cassegrain, Graham Kita, and Chelsea Kita. The Helping Hands were Chelsea Kita who also looked after the check-in at the door and Terri Kita who sold 50/50 tickets. Arriving early to the theatre to set up the staging, lighting, sound and backdrops were **Shawn Farquhar**, **Alex Zander**, **Graham Kita**, **Pranreet Arora**, **Simon Cassegrain** and **Rod Boss**. The doors opened at 2:30 p.m. and showtime was at 3:00 p.m. **Rod Boss** was the producer of the competition, and he also produced the souvenir programme booklet with the names and photos of each of the competitors. There were also several sponsors in the programme. He also did the layout and printing of the booklet.

The ushers were **Charles Gauthier** and **Pranreet Arora** as they led the audience members to their places. The ticket scanner was **Simon Cassegrain**. **Dylan Hempenstall** handed out the voting tickets.

Before show time walk around magic was performed by **Rod Boss**, **Dylan Hempenstall**, **Jack Schwartz** and **Michael Nemeth**. The timekeeper was **Michael Nemeth**. The criteria judges were **Ken Cowie**, **Michael Nemeth** and **Billy Hsueh**. The awards director was **Simon Cassegrain**.

The competitors (in order of appearance) were Magic Max aka Alex Zander, Roy Hopwood, Melrick the Magician aka John Stenning, Graham Kita and Yoosik Oum. The stagehands were Ray Wong and Pranreet Arora. Shawn Farquhar was in charge of the sound and lighting. He was also the technical supervisor. During the competition, some of the performers had children come up on stage to be their ''magician's assistant''

After the competition, the audience members gathered in front of the stage area to vote for their favourite performer. The voting was done by ballot boxes each with a headshot photo of the performers.

Unfortunately, one competitor was disqualified for going over the ten-minute time limit.

After the votes were tabulated and the voting process was done by the VMC team, there was a prize draw **Rod Boss** drew the winning tickets. It is customary that after the competition, the previous winner and MC of The Children's Magician of the Year do a magic presentation. **Rod Boss** introduced **Rod Chow** who was dressed in a gold sequined suit.

After his colourful performance, it was time to announce the winner of The Children's Magician of the Year for the Wilf Rutherford Trophy for 2024. The winner was Graham Kita. Rod Boss presented the trophy to Graham. Congratulations to Graham and the rest of the competitors. Photos of the presentation were taken by Terri Kita. Simon Cassegrain was the official photographer. BillyHsueh did the videotaping. The audience members enjoyed a great afternoon of magic. The attendance was just over one hundred. To end The Children's Magician of the Year competition and the Festival of Magic, Rod Boss thanked the audience members for attending the competition and the Festival of Magic and helping make the event a success. He also thanked Rick Bronson's House of Comedy for providing the venue. He mentioned he hopes to see everyone back next year! It has been a fast and exciting week of magic. MM: Tell us a little about yourself and your family

CG: I was born and raised in Winnipeg, Manitoba. I did my undergraduate (Bachelor of Arts) and graduate school (Master of City Planning) at the University of Manitoba. I started my career as a community economic development officer in rural Manitoba, but moved out west in 1990 to Summerland, BC to do similar work. In 1992, I moved to Vancouver and became the General Manager of the Downtown Vancouver Business Improvement Association, now known as Downtown Van. I stepped down as President and CEO of Downtown Van in 2021 after a 29-year tenure to enjoy retirement and pursue old and new hobbies. I'm married to my lovely wife Donna who was an elementary school teacher in Surrey for 35 years. We're both active in our community and enjoy travel.

MM: How did you become interested in magic?

CG: The fire was first lit when I was on stage with a magician at my dad's annual Christmas family event. I must have been seven or eight years old. The magician did a linking ring trick that mesmerized me. Ever since I've loved magic, but only started doing magic myself much later.

MM: Who are your biggest influences in the magic world?

CG: This is tough to answer because I have so many favourites. But here are a few— Doug Henning, Lance Burton, David Copperfield.

MM: What is your favorite trick to perform and why?

CG: Con Cam Coincidencia by Paul Wilson because I can perform it with a borrowed deck.

MM: Can you share an interesting story from one of your performances?

CC. Talia and a state and interesting story from one of your person mances:

CG: I did an elementary school performance last year where a young spectator who was helping me with my egg bag performance decided to spike my wooden egg into the gymnasium floor. Without missing a beat (yes, it alarmed me), I picked up the undamaged egg and carried on with the routine, and the rest of my act.

MM: What advice would you give to someone who wants to learn magic?

CG: Find ways to learn and collaborate with other magicians so that you can become a better magician. VMC meetings and getting together for coffee or lunch with club members in between meetings has helped me immensely.

MM: How do you come up with new tricks or routines?

CG: At this moment in my development as a magician I'm not deviating too much from established tricks and rou-

tines by other magicians other than coming up with my own patter so it sounds more genuine.

MM: What's the most challenging part of being a magician for you?

CG: Staying focused by practicing and perfecting routines I already know rather than gravitating to the new shiny magic products filling my email inbox every single day.



MM: What's the most rewarding part of being a magician for you?

CG: That I can stir a wide range of reactions and emotions from the audience— from scepticism to disbelief to wonderment.

MM: Can you share with our readers a fun, non magic, fact that we didn't know about you?

CG: I have hiked the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu with my wife on a guided tour back in 2006. We followed that up next year with a backpacking trip on the beautiful 75-kilometre West Coast Trail on Vancouver Island.

I Recall...

The show must go on.

"The show must go on" is a phrase in show business, meaning that regardless of what happens, whatever show has been planned still has to be staged for the waiting patrons.

The saying and principle are traditional in the theatre, but they both originated in the 19th century with circuses. If an animal got loose or a performer was injured, the ringmaster and the band tried to keep things going so that the crowd would not panic because "it is a point of honour not to let the other players down by deserting them when no understudy is available".

"The Show Must Go On" is also a song by British rock band Queen, featured as the twelfth and final track on their 1991 album, 'Innuendo'. It is credited to Queen but written mainly by Brian May. The song chronicles the effort of frontman Freddie Mercury to continue to perform despite approaching the end of his life, although his diagnosis with HIV/AIDS had not yet been made public despite ongoing media speculation claiming that he was seriously ill. When the band recorded the song'.

'Harry Houdini was proud enough of his superb musculature and toned body to allow the audience to feel his biceps or punch him in his ripped abdomen.

As the story goes, a few medical students from **McGill University** visited **Houdini** in his dressing room at 5 p.m. on Oct. 22, 1926, after his matinee show at the **Princess Theatre** in Montreal. A few days earlier, **Houdini** had lectured at **McGill** about his work in exposing fake mediums and spiritualists. One student, **Joselyn Gordon Whitehead** asked if he could take a punch and immediately **Houdini** nodded an assent. The student hit the great magician twice but before he had a chance to tighten his abdominal muscles and brace himself. The "hammer-like" punches caused visible pain and **Houdini** stopped **Whitehead** in mid-blow on the third attempt to punch his gut.

As **Houdini** travelled by train for more than 15 hours to his next performance in **Detroit**, he experienced a great deal of pain, which he blamed solely on the belly punches and a recently fractured foot.

By the time **Houdini** got to the **Garrick Theatre** in **Detroit**, his temperature was 104 degrees Fahrenheit. A physician was called to his dressing room and diagnosed Harry with acute appendicitis. The doctor ordered an ambulance to take **Houdini** immediately to the hospital, but the performer had been schooled on the adage that "the show must go on!"

He declined the medico's help, declaring, "I'll do this show if it's my last." The performance was not his best but did not include him collapsing on the stage or having to be rescued from the water torture chamber by an axe-wielding assistant as many apocryphal tales and motion pictures have claimed."

I can recall in July 1969 following a serious motor vehicle crash (another car was speeding, lost control and collided with my car) I sustained a head injury that required sutures. I was a member of the **King Island Drama Club** and was due to play the part of **Furse the Butler** to be in a stage performance of **'Little Lord Fauntleroy'**.

The **Drama Club** after hearing of the accident and that I had 'died', quickly sourced someone else to play my part. When I arrived at the hall for the show, the cast was surprised but very pleased to see me. They were even more surprised when I said that I was going to go on and play my part, as '**The show must go on**.'

Before 'curtain up' the director appeared in front of tabs and explained to the audience what had happened and why my head was covered in bandages, I think this was the first time I had received such applause before a performance. During the intermission, my doctor, who was in the audience, came backstage to see how I was and to give me a couple of painkillers.

There have been many occasions when I can recall not being well and having gigs (Magic; Balloon Twister; Santa etc.) to attend, I would do the gig(s) and then crash in a heap when I got home.

Let me make one thing clear: it isn't just when you do the gig even though you are not really up to it, it also applies to helping out a fellow performer, when they are unable to due to any reason, and you step in and do their gig. I recall in Adelaide getting a phone call from the wife of one of my colleagues, saying that they needed another person to ensure all of the guests (several hundred) at the function got to see some close-up magic. She initially phoned another performer who was a lot closer to the venue

than I was, however, he had to "think about it" so she phoned me. I asked for the address and said, "I am on my way." She; my colleagues and the venue were most appreciative.

I haven't been feeling well lately and I have the most important gig since arriving in Canada almost 5 years ago, coming up on March 30, 2024. This is the **Vancouver Magic Circle**'s **(VMC)** 2024 **'Children's Magician of the Year' (CMOTY)** competition in front of a paying audience.



By the time you read this, the competition will be done and dusted. Even if I am unwell, I will still compete as 'The show must go on.'

Editors note: I didn't win but did well and I must compliment my fellow contestants **Alex Zander**, **John Stenning**; **Yoosik Oum** and the winner, **Graham Kita** – we put on a great show for over 100 people.

I am sure that I am not the only one who follows the adage 'The show must go on'. It would be great to hear from you and your experiences.

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



The aces and court cards – Spades and Diamonds.



Who is Orlando Carmelo Scarnecchia better known as?

John Scarne

John Scarne (March 4, 1903 – July 7, 1985) was an American magician and author who was particularly adept at playing card manipulation. He became known as an expert on cards and other games and authored several popular books on cards, gambling, and related topics.

He was born **Orlando Carmelo Scarnecchia** in Steubenville, Ohio, United States, and at some point, anglicized his name to **John Scarne**. He grew up in the New Jersey communities of Fairview and Guttenberg. When he left school after the eighth grade, he learned from a local card sharp how to perform such swindles as The Three Card Monte, and how to cheat in gambling card games by manipulating the cards.

What is the 'Dead Man's Hand'?

Ace of Spades; Ace of Clubs; 8 of Spades and the 8 of Clubs

The accepted makeup of Poker's '*Dead Man's Hand*' has varied through the years. Currently, it is described as a two-pair poker hand consisting of black aces and black eights. The pair of aces and eights, along with an unknown hole card, were reportedly held by Old West folk hero, lawman, and gunfighter **Wild Bill Hickok** when he was murdered while playing a game. No contemporaneous source, however, records the exact cards he held when killed. Author **Frank Wilstach**'s 1926 book, **Wild Bill Hickok**: The Prince of Pistoleers, led to the popular modern-held conception of the poker hand's contents.

What is currently considered the dead man's hand card combination received its notoriety from a legend that it was the five-card stud or five-card draw hand, held by **Wild Bill Hickok** when he was shot in the back of the head by **Jack McCall** on August 2, 1876, in Nuttal & Mann's Saloon, Deadwood, Dakota Territory. **Hickok's** final hand purportedly included the aces and eights of both black suits.

According to a book by Western historian **Carl W. Breihan**, the cards were retrieved from the floor by a man named **Neil Christy**, who then passed them on to his son. The son, in turn, told **Mr. Breihan** of the composition of the hand. "Here is an exact identity of these cards as told to me by Christy's son: the ace of diamonds with a heel mark on it; the ace of clubs; the two black eights, clubs and spades, and the queen of hearts with a small drop of **Hickok**'s blood on it", though nothing of the sort was reported at the time immediately following the shooting.

Which magician was the first person to show films in the UK?

David Devant

Devant was a pioneer of early cinema in London. On 19 March 1896 Devant showed the first films ever seen in the UK. These Edison films were shown at *Maskelyne's Egyptian Hall* using a film projector (known as the *Theatrograph*) made by R. W. Paul, two days before Paul himself demonstrated his new machine in public at Olympia. Also that year Devant began his association with the pioneer of cinematic special effects, Georges Méliès, to whom he sold a *Theatrograph*. Devant then toured the country showing films, and for a time became Méliès' sole agent in Great Britain selling both his films and cameras. As well as being an early exhibitor of film, Devant appeared in three films made by Paul and another by Méliès (*D. Devant, prestidigitation*, 1897). Méliès also used one of Devant's stage acts, which involved making a portrait of a woman come to life, to create his 1903 film, *The Spiritualist Photographer* (*Le Portrait Spirite*).

Who is credited with the invention of the *Chop Cup*?

A fairly modern development is the 'chop cup'. This cup was invented around 1954 by Al Wheatley who performed a Chinese-costumed act with the name "Chop Chop". The chop cup is a variation of the cups and balls with one cup and (apparently) one ball, hugely popular because it requires only a very small flat area to perform, unlike the considerable table space needed for the classic three-cup routine. The Chicago close-up magician Don Alan performed his streamlined chop cup routine on television. and was immediately copied by magicians all over the world. Paul Daniels' routine with the chop cup has also done a lot for the routine's popularity. The chop cup can be handled entirely by the top, creating a more seemingly impossible performance.
