2 **CMOTY**

The Magic Festival ended with the Children's Magician of the Year (CMOTY) competition for the Wilf Rutherford trophy for 2025.

The competition took place at Rick Bronson's House of Comedy in New Westminster on Saturday, March 29, 2025

Arriving early to the theatre to set up the staging, lighting, sound, and backdrops were Simon Cassegrain, Jonathan Santiago, Shawn Farquhar, Graham, Kita Roy Hopwood, and James Nguyen.

Simon Cassegrain was the producer of the competition. Simon Cassegrain produced the souvenir booklet with the names and photos of each of the competitors. Charles Gauthier looked after the printing of the booklet. Charles Gauthier was the ticket scanner, and he also handed out the voting ballots.

The criteria judges were Michael Nemeth, James Nguyen, and Charles Gauthier. The stagehands were Scott Barker and Guan Yow Low.

After the competition, the audience members gathered to vote for their favourite performer. The voting was done by ballot boxes, each with a headshot photo of the performers. The votes were tabulated, and the voting process was done by the VMC team of Charles Gauthier, Simon Cassegrain, Dylan Hempenstall and James Nguyen.

It is customary that the previous winner of the CMOTY, Graham Kita, do a magical presentation. After his colourful performance, it was time to announce the winner for the Wilf Rutherford trophy for 2025.

The Amazing Kreskin



The Amazing Kreskin (born **George Joseph Kresge Jr.**, January 12, 1935 – December 10, 2024), also known as **Kreskin**, was an American mentalist who became popular on television in the 1970s. He was inspired to become a mentalist by Lee Falk's comic strip *Mandrake the Magician*, which features a crime-fighting stage magician. He always presented himself as a mentalist, never as a psychic, who operated on the basis of suggestion, not the paranormal or supernatural.

George Joseph Kresge Jr. was born on January 12, 1935, in Montclair, New Jersey, to a Polish father and Sicilian mother and grew up with his younger brother in Caldwell, New Jersey, where he would reside for most of his life. His father worked for a battery manufacturer. Kreskin attended Seton Hall University, earning a degree in psychology. He worked for several years as a clinical psychologist while developing his act.

From 1972 to 1975, Kreskin's television series *The Amazing World of Kreskin* was broadcast throughout Canada on CTV and distributed in syndication in the United States. It was produced in Ottawa, Ontario, at the CJOH-TV studios. An additional set of episodes was produced from 1975 to 1977 at the studios of CFTO-TV in Toronto, billed as *The New Kreskin Show*.

His first television appearance was on *The Steve Allen Show* in 1964. He went on to appear approximately 100 times on each of *The Mike Douglas Show* and *The Merv Griffin Show* and 88 times on *The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson*. It was Carson who dubbed Kreskin "The Amazing Kreskin". Kreskin claimed that his appearance on the *Steve Allen Show*, during which he tripped when blinded by stage lights, inspired Carson to have his Carnac the Magnificent character habitually stumble on his way to the *Tonight Show* desk.

In the 1980s and 1990s, Kreskin came to prominence again through several appearances on *Late Night with David Letterman* and *The Howard Stern Show* as well as around 100 appearances on *Live with Regis and Kathie Lee* (now *Live with Kelly and Mark*). In 2009, he became the first guest to make four appearances on *Late Night with Jimmy Fallon*.^[14]

Though Kreskin made "predictions", he did not claim to have paranormal or clairvoyant powers, and did not like to be considered a "psychic". One of his best known tricks was to find his own check for his current performance. If he did not find it, he did not get paid for that day. He would instruct the audience to hide an envelope containing his paycheck, while he was escorted off stage and into seclusion by other members of the audience. He then re-emerged and hunted through the audience, almost always being able to ferret out the correct location.

Kreskin taught classes for law enforcement groups, which "focused on psychological methods such as jogging lost memories through relaxation techniques or detecting lies through body language and voice inflections".

Kreskin's popularity peaked in the 1970s and early 1980s, though he continued to perform into the 2020s. He appeared regularly on WPIX in New York City, and annually on both the Fox News Channel and CNN to give his New Year's Day predictions for the coming year. Kreskin's last television appearance was on Fox Business on May 2, 2023; predicting the Super Bowl, and his last scheduled performance was on March 7, 2024, a "pendulum seminar" on Zoom.

He had no children and never married.

Old or New?

Is your magic 'old' or 'new,' and I don't mean old as in need of repair or replacing. I mean old in the sense that the trick or principle has been around for many years. Or is it a new trick or principle that has been 'invented' or discovered recently?

How do you know if the trick or principle is new? Did the dealer's blurb suggest that it is the latest blockbuster of a trick that you must have, and that you would be crazy not to pay the high price asked for it? Or maybe you saw the 'new' trick or learned the 'new' principle on social media.

There is an exceptionally good chance that this 'new' trick or 'new' principle is not new at all; it may be a variation of an old trick or principle. Try reading and studying old magic books.

You don't remember or are too young to know what books are? Well, a book is:

A creation made of written or printed words, bound together to form a collection of thoughts, ideas, stories, or knowledge. They can take the form of physical pages held together by a cover.

By reading some of these old books, you will find an almost endless supply of ideas. This is called research (see my column 'I Recall... To Research or Not') and could save money by making up the trick yourself.

You may have to apply a little creativity (See my column 'I Recall... Creative or Not') to make the trick relevant to today's audience and put your own twist on it to ensure that it fits in with your performance style.

On 29 March 2025 I competed for the Vancouver Magic Circle (VMC) 2025 Children's Magician of the Year (CMOTY) competition in front of a capacity audience of 124 people, with the winner being decided by audience vote.

Four VMC members, including myself, competed. 2 of whom, not me, were considered the most likely to win. After the votes were counted, I was declared the winner, one friend described my win as akin to 'David and Goliath.'

Why did I mention this?

•This competition is a highly prestigious competition within the VMC, and it highlights the absolute best children's entertainers in the VMC.

•I want to brag about winning against the 'Best'.

•My act consisted of 'old' tricks presented in my style.

The competition has a strict 10-minute time limit – I did it with 8 seconds to spare. My act consisted of, in order of performance:

The Professor's Nightmare.

"The Professor's Nightmare", also known as "Equally Unequal Ropes," was invented by Bob Carver and won the IBM Originality Trophy in 1957. It was based on earlier rope routines, such as Hen Fetsch's "Quad Ropelets" from 1955. The name "Professor's Nightmare" was coined by Gene Gordon, who marketed the trick in 1958.

The Egg Bag.

The origins of "The Egg Bag" can be traced back centuries, as variations of the trick have been performed around the world. The modern version owes much to magicians like Malini and Charlie Miller, who refined the routine into the iconic piece of magic we know today.

Isaac Fawkes (also spelled Fawkes, Fawks, or Faux) was an English conjurer and performer from the early 18th century. He gained fame for his skillful performances, which included the Egg Bag trick.

The Colouring Book.

The Colouring Book, originally known as 'The Blow Book', is one of the oldest magic tricks, dating back to the 16th century. It's a cleverly engineered book that appears to transform its contents as the magician flips through its pages. Early mentions of the Blow Book can be found in works like Reginald Scot's *The Discoverie of Witchcraft* (1584), which described how magicians could prepare such books to amaze audiences.

I hope you can see that 'old' doesn't mean irrelevant in today's world, and 'new' is not necessarily new. Why not find an 'old' magic book and read it either physically or via the electronic medium of your choice, and you will find plenty of new ... er old ideas waiting for you to develop into your performance style.

IN & OUT BOXES

APPRENTICE MAGIC (From Murphy's)

This is marketed in the apprentice line of magic targeted to beginners, however, there are some creative uses possible with this item, or items: basically, you take apart, for example, a plain looking black plastic box into two pieces and inside is a red plastic box (which you could have previously put something into) and yet, somehow, you are able to put the Black box into the red box and close it/cover it up! Magic! (it's the only explanation, LOL!)

Obviously, it won't fool your magician friends, however, perhaps you could incorporate it into a show for kids, as they might enjoy it.

There are instructions that you can download, however, it's really not rocket science and you'll most likely be able to figure it out all on your own.

And hey, for less than \$10 U.S. it's just good clean fun.



On Saturday, February 22, 2025, at 1:00 pm, a special Presidential Citation was presented to Quincy Li, owner of Clownin' Around magic shop, which is located on Granville Island. The Citation was presented to Quincy Li for his dedication and service to the magic community. In attendance to witness this special occasion were some members of the Vancouver Magic Circle. Magic Went WONG

PART 2 (Continued from November) about the importance of being **SEEN** and **HEARD** during your performance.

Thoughts to consider:

• Practice learning how to use a microphone effectively and familiarize yourself with all the different types of microphones that are available (wireless headsets, lavalier/lapel, wired and wireless mics, with a mic stand and without, etc.). In some cases, your only option may be to use the venue's microphone or wireless mic/headset mic system.

• Aging sucks. In my mid to late 40's I started to notice that halfway through shows, occasionally, I would lose my voice (vocal cord atrophy). Now I always have a bottle of water standing by before, during and after my performances, and try to follow good vocal hygiene before a show.

• Choosing the best spot to perform in the room/outdoor venue – so the audience is comfortable and can see you (though there may be staging or angle restriction issues due to certain effects). Sometimes it's the organizers who have the final say where you have to perform, and you just have to make the best of it. It would also be helpful to study blocking and staging techniques as it relates to the theatre.

• Take charge! A number of times, I asked the organizer to set up 3-4 rows of 8 chairs, directly in front of the dance floor, as close to me, the performer, as possible - **rather than having everyone 20+ feet away** around the outside perimeter of a dance floor sitting in round tables (after dinner) in a ballroom. Having my audience as close to the performance as possible helped engage my guests, producing better interaction and stronger reactions. My adult comedy magic act relied heavily on volunteers for numerous effects I was performing at the time – such as my GANGNAM STYLE version of the (Linking) RINGS and my BILL IN FRUIT routine. The end result, they were able to **SEE** and **HEAR** better!

During my active performing years, (FOR MY NEEDS AND THE TYPES OF SHOWS I DID at that time...) I would carry a 150 watt/350 watt clamp-on Flood Light, my Samson AirLine Wireless (Fitness) Headset (microphone) system, 2 wired microphones (XLR plus a 1/4 inch), numerous adapters and connectors, a "GIM CRACK Microphone Holder" (which came in handy so many times!), gooseneck mic stand with round base, extension cords, etc.

About 30 years ago, I purchased Anchor Audio's Voyager PB-2000 PA sound system. This Voyager model, now discontinued, suited my needs perfectly, is super easy to operate, and only weighted 20 lbs - easy on the back! It still works and I've brought it to the VMC meetings numerous times for the members to use.

Be happy to **HEAR (sound systems, music control, etc**) what others are using these days - **SEE** you soon!

I continue to thank my VMC friends for helping me grow as a hobbyist magician











It's all just an illusion

Impossible Cube



The Impossible Cube Figure was created by Maurits Cornelis Escher (1898 - 1972), a Dutch graphic artist, as part of his lithograph print <u>Belvedere</u>, which contains a variety of impossible figures. Belevedere was created in 1958, and the original version is now in the National Gallery of Canada, in Ontario.

The Impossible Cube is an impossible figure (or impossible object or undecidable figure): it depicts an object which could not possibly exist. It's impossible for the Impossible Cube to exist because in order for it to exist rules of Euclidean geometry would have to be violated. For example, parts of the cube are represented as being simultaneously at the front and the back of the cube

Illusion Credit:
